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The Gospel is for People Everywhere

BIBLE BEGINNINGS

Ask teenagers to read the Bible and missions stories below, or you may read them together, providing access to the vocabulary list. Print activities as desired.

- 1. Peter and Cornelius (Acts 10:9-36; 44-48)
- 2. Hudson Taylor, Lost and Found

James Hudson Taylor was born in England in 1932. Though he had been raised in a Christian home and taught to pray and support mission work worldwide, as a teenager, he made the drastic decision to reject God. Hudson had tried in his own way to become a Christian, but all his efforts seemed useless, so he began to live a selfish and destructive life. He and his friends were skeptical of Christianity since many of the Christians they knew were living as hypocrites. But two years later, Hudson read a tract clearly explaining that God changes the hearts of men. He was suddenly drawn to God in a new way and accepted salvation in Jesus. When this happened, his mother and sister revealed it was an answer to prayers they had been praying daily for him. He took their example to heart and became faithful to pray for God to supply him with wisdom and meet his material needs.

About four years later, the Lord led Hudson to China as a missionary. Hudson and his supporters insisted the Gospel needed to be available to more unreached people groups in the country's interior, so he named his mission organization China Inland Mission. After some time in China, Hudson realized that Chinese people viewed him as an outsider. He became so determined to reach them that he grew a beard and queue and began dressing as a Chinese man. He ensured that churches were built in the Chinese style and worked to develop leaders among the Chinese believers, realizing they were better equipped to reach their own people. Hudson died and was buried in China at age 73. Still, his legacy lives on in Christian missions worldwide, teaching others the importance of helping and training native missionaries. His story is a shining example of someone who prayed for God to save souls and provide for his every need—something Hudson knew only God could do.

Discuss these questions with your teen.

Why might people from other ethnic groups reject the Gospel when it comes from someone who is of a different culture than their own?

Do you ever feel like an outsider concerning God's love? Why do you think that is? How can you choose to believe God loves you as much as He loved both Peter and Cornelius?

Dear Heavenly Father,

Thank you for what you teach us about yourself in these stories. Clearly, you love all of us and do not have favorite groups of people. Help me to love others like Hudson Taylor and share the Gospel with people everywhere.

DAY 2

The Gospel is for Children, Too

BIBLE BEGINNINGS

Ask teenagers to read the Bible and missionary stories below, or you may read them together, providing access to the vocabulary list. Print the activities as desired.

- 1. Jesus heals a nobleman's son (John 4:46-54)
- 2. Artyom and Alex, the Orphans

In Ukraine, many children and **adolescents** end up in **orphanages** every year because of parental drug and alcohol-related **addiction**, **depression**, and spiritual darkness. Seven-year-old Artyom was one of these children. When his father died, his life changed forever. Abandoned by his mother, Artyom was placed in an orphanage where he felt all alone. At eleven, he was **transferred** to a different orphanage, fitting in no better than before. The loss of his father and home, combined with the **rejection** from his mother, troubled him deeply. He struggled with an aching anger and a loneliness that never left. He could not make friends with the other children and did not play with them, evidence that he felt thrown away like a piece of trash. Embarrassed by the extent of his **poverty**, he still never failed to hand wash and hang out the **threadbare** clothes he wore daily. They were his only possession from home — his *real* home. Life felt like a never-ending nightmare with no hope for the future.

One day, Alex, a big, friendly man, visited to play with the children and share the love of Jesus. Alex understood the shame and worthlessness orphans feel. His own mother died when he was ten. However, she had been the one to introduce him to Jesus, so Alex grew up knowing of his heavenly Father's love. His experience as an orphan made Alex dedicate himself to ministry to orphans. Alex started bringing Artyom to his home on weekends, and the boy began to thrive. The love Alex showed him eventually triumphed, and Artyom accepted Jesus Christ as his Savior. Shortly afterward, he was adopted, and a life of hope and love began. Alex had a lot of love to share and could clearly see the inner needs of the orphans he visited. He prayed and collected donations to grow his ministry and help children like Artyom. This included provision for two homes for teenagers who were too old to stay in orphanages anymore. The children named these homes the Lighthouses. With the funding secured for these homes, Alex could continue to spread God's light, teaching orphans about the love of their heavenly Father.

Thank you for paying attention to children and caring for them. Help me grow to love children as much as you do and become a lighthouse, like Alex, for people in dark circumstances.

DAY 3

God Loves People Who Are in Need

BIBLE BEGINNINGS

Ask teenagers to read the Bible and missionary stories below, or you may read them together, providing access to the vocabulary list. Print activities as desired.

- 1. Elisha and the widow (2 Kings 4:1-7)
- 2. Joy's Journey

Joy Tica was born in the Philippines, a country made up of islands in Southeast Asia. The Philippines is on the eastern edge of the Asiatic Mediterranean sea. Although the Philippines is a Christian nation, many of the people there still don't have a personal relationship with God. Joy's father was a pastor and dedicated his ministry to bringing people closer to God. From a young age, Joy and her siblings helped with the family ministry.

Unfortunately, ministry work didn't always pay the bills. To make ends meet, everyone in the family had to work. Joy helped sell treats and clothes on the street or in the market. When she was younger, she thought of this work as a heavy **obligation**, but as she got older she began to **appreciate** it.

Although **finances** were tight, Joy's family worked hard to send her to nursing school. She volunteered for Christian Outreach and Relief Group (CORG) while she was studying and working. CORG focused on meeting physical and **spiritual needs** for **impoverished** people around the world, including in the Philippines. Joy saw **firsthand** that her own country didn't just need nurses – they also needed doctors. She prayed, "Lord, I want to be a medical doctor. Send me to medical school." There was barely enough money for nursing school, so she knew she didn't have enough money for medical school, but she trusted that God would provide.

When she was still in nursing school, her uncle got sick. She spent a lot of time taking care of him and a friend of his from the U.S., who was a medical doctor, came to visit. When the doctor also got sick, Joy took care of him too. He was a **fellow** believer, so Joy told him about her dreams and prayers of being a medical doctor someday. The doctor returned to the U.S. after he **recovered** and told his wife about Joy's God-given dream. His wife was a medical **scholar** and wanted to help, so she wrote Joy a letter offering to pay for medical school.

Now Dr. Joy is a doctor and **medical missionary** in the **rural areas** of the Philippines. When she and her team provide free medical care to people who can't afford it, they also tell people about Jesus. Many people have their bodies and souls **healed** from this ministry.

DAY 4

Sometimes Christians Are Mistreated for Trying to Spread the Gospel

BIBLE BEGINNINGS

Ask teenagers to read the Bible and missionary stories below, or you may read them together, providing access to the vocabulary list. Print the activities as desired.

- 1. Peter is put in prison (Acts 12:1-19)
- 2. Imprisoned!

In many areas of the nation of Myanmar, it is illegal to hold Christian church gatherings. Despite the danger, the **underground church** is growing. Christians there have to be cautious when they meet to worship God with other believers, practicing their religion in secret. Often, they do not sing or read their Bibles aloud for fear of imprisonment. They could even be **martyred** for their faith.

In 2017, the rebel **communist** army that rules a portion of Myanmar arrested 98 missionaries in an effort to rid their area of any religions other than **Buddhism**. Pastor Sita was one of the Christians who was jailed for six months in that particular **campaign**. While in prison, he was severely beaten, allowed no visitors, and barely fed enough to remain alive. Eventually, he was released. When he first returned to his village, he found his church and home burned to the ground. Anxiously searching for his family, he was relieved to discover his three children living in a tent. They had survived by selling used plastic on the streets—and with a little help from Pastor John.

Once all the Christian leaders were released from prison, Pastor John gathered them for a three-day **conference**. This was held in a neighboring country to ensure everyone's safety. He knew how desperately they needed rest and **encouragement**. They spent some time giving updates on how they were doing, crying many tears, and sharing stories of what they had been through. Then they prayed for each other, asking God to restore their ministries and to help strengthen them. Before returning home, they were treated to some sightseeing and a special meal at a restaurant where they feasted together once more. It was a refreshing and memorable time as they prepared to continue God's work in Myanmar - where simply believing in Jesus is dangerous.

Pastor John also helped Pastor Sita contact his wife, but the **persecution** had become too much for her. She refused to return home. Presently, because of the risk of being caught, Pastor Sita stays on the move constantly, holding **irregular** meetings with the church he leads.

What are some things you can do to strengthen your faith in God today?

Dear Heavenly Father,

Thank you for teaching us that you notice those persecuted for Christ's sake. Help me to remember to pray for persecuted Christians and to find ways to help encourage Christians worldwide.

DAY 5

God Loves People From the Most Remote Places on Earth

BIBLE BEGINNINGS

Ask teenagers to read the Bible and missionary stories below, or you may read them together, providing access to the vocabulary list. Print activities as desired.

- 1. Paul visits Athens (Acts 17:16-34)
- 2. Jim and Elisabeth Elliot

Phillip James "Jim" Elliot was born into a Christian home and became a follower of Jesus when he was six years old. When he was old enough to attend college in 1945, he decided to study **linguistics** and become a missionary. While in college, Jim spent time **evangelizing** people in Mexico. Evangelism in another country helped him feel certain that God had called him to be a missionary.

In 1952, he and another friend who was also passionate about reaching the unreached set sail on a ship bound for Ecuador, South America. Their goal was to bring the Gospel to a **tribe** who lived deep in the **Amazon** jungle. This people group, the **Waorani**, had never heard about Jesus and they were known as fierce **warriors**.

Once in Ecuador, other missionaries and family members joined them. The five young missionaries knew it would be difficult and dangerous to reach the unreached tribe. First, they had to learn **Spanish**. Then, they had to learn the more difficult tribal language of **Quichua** so they could communicate with the **native** tribes.

They learned some simple words and phrases in that language so they could introduce themselves and drop gifts from a yellow airplane. In January of 1956, a disaster happened. There was a **misunderstanding** between the missionaries and the native tribe because of the **language barrier**. The Waorani killed the missionaries.

Some of the missionaries had families living with them before they were killed. Jim was married to a woman named Elisabeth, who was the daughter of missionaries. When Elisabeth was in college, she studied Bible translation and shared Jim's passion for missions. Elisabeth and Jim had a daughter and they were all living in Ecuador together when the Waorani killed Jim.

Elisabeth was terrified of the Waorani tribe because of what they did to her husband and friends, but she also knew that God loved them no matter what they had done. She and the sister of another **martyred** missionary spent two years learning the Quichua language and eventually moved into a Waorani village. For five years, she shared the Gospel with the Waorani people and loved them just like Jesus loves us.

PAUSE AND PONDER

Discuss these questions with your teen.

Why do you think Elisabeth went to the Waorani people even though her husband and other people had already been killed while trying to bring the Gospel to them?

Would you have the courage to share the Gospel with someone who hurt your family? Why or why not?

Even though the five missionaries were killed, their deaths helped open doors for the Gospel to be taken to the Woarani people. Have you ever seen God bring something good from a bad situation?

POWERFUL PRAYERS

Dear Heavenly Father,

Thank you for showing us the great lengths you go to reach unreached people groups with the Gospel. Help me to pray for the salvation of people who have never heard about you as I obey the command to take the Gospel to the ends of the earth.

In Jesus' name, Amen.

CONCLUSION

WHY DO MISSIONS MATTER?

Matthew 24:14 clearly states the Gospel is to be preached to all people groups of the world.

And this gospel of the kingdom will be preached in the whole world as a testimony to all nations, and then the end will come.

We hope you and your child have been encouraged with this series of stories and activities to find your place in the mission to reach the unreached for Christ.

Preparation and Supply List

Every Day:

Crayons, colored pencils, or markers (for maps)

Index card and writing utensil (for verse activity)

Printouts of activities (for puzzles.)

Hands-On Heroes Projects

Before you begin:

Parents should preview the craft videos for each day, ensuring the teen can safely complete all steps. If not, please prepare the necessary items in advance. You may also want to review the supply lists to be sure you have everything on hand to complete the projects.

Day 1: Chinese Lantern

Follow the instructions in the video link below to make a Chinese lantern to hang up to remind you of Hudson Taylor and to pray for China.

For today's project, much of the work requires an Exacto knife and glue gun. Parents may want to closely supervise teens during the activity for safety. The use of a glue gun should also be completed or monitored by the parent.

- Scissors
- Exacto knife
- Cutting mat or thick piece of cardboard for cutting paper with knife
- Ruler
- Pencil
- Glue stick
- Clear double-sided tape
- Low-temperature glue gun with glue stick
- Thin crochet needle or alternate piece of metal for shaping paper

Lightweight red paper (not cardstock):

For the first part of the project, you need three pieces: (a 29 x 16 cm piece, a 29 x 21 cm piece, and a circular piece with an 11 cm diameter).

For the second part of the project, you need three more pieces: (a 20 x $\frac{1}{2}$ cm strip, an 18 x 8 cm piece, and a 14 x 14 cm piece)

Lightweight yellow paper (not cardstock):

For the first part of the project, you need two strips (29 cm x 1 ½ cm each).

For the second part of the project, you need three more pieces: (a $12 \times 1 \frac{1}{2}$ cm piece, an 18×8 cm piece, and a 14×14 piece)

Three small battery-operated tea lights

- 18x11 piece of paper in the color of your choice, most commonly white
- 1 red medical symbol made from paper
- Scissors for cutting out the medical symbol
- Tape to secure the last fold of the hat, just in case


